Services Offered

We utilize the Native Cultural Way to assist individuals in reclaiming their spirituality, which may become obscured by addiction. Through our program, we have distributed numerous one-year sobriety coins, a testament to its efficacy. Our Wellness House remains accessible to the community, operating around the clock to provide support and assistance to those in need.

Wellbriety: A holistic approach to sobriety that includes physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual wellness. The concept of wellbriety is based on the belief that addiction is a symptom of a larger issue. Wellbriety to me includes all around health for our minds, body, spirit. Even if you aren't where you want to be yet, come it in a meeting. People do not have to talk, just listen and receive good energy. If you aren't sure you want to sweat, come sit by the fire and just be there. Open to those all in need of healing!

Currently, we offer Wellbriety Meetings 5 days a week at 12:00p.m. On Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays are open to the public. On Tuesdays and Thursdays are for Tribal and Community members. Monday nights are Wellbriety co-ed sweats go in at 6:00p.m.

Services Offered

Disabled Elders Emergency Service Program (DEESP) (Nisqually only)

The DEESP is designed to perform needed repairs to ensure the safety of existing residential houses owned by Nisqually elders residing in the reservation boundaries or within 50-mile radius of the reservation.

Beautification (Nisqually only)

The beautification program is designed to perform needed repairs and improvements to existing residential houses owned by Nisqually Tribal members residing in the reservation boundaries or within Thurston/Pierce counties.

The work is scheduled on a first come first served basis using a detailed and numbered list of applicants which is kept at the building department. Some exceptions for safety or emergency may be considered for approval of the Building Department director. The budget is finite and changes from year to year which all affects the number of tribal members that can be served each year.

Services Offered

The Chief Leschi Cemetery hours of operation are from 8:00am-3:00pm. We have a sign-in sheet for any who enter into the warehouse. The back gate will remain open from: Dawn (7:00am) to Dusk. If the trash bins are full feel no pressure with just leaving the compost and trash in a pile by the path, it will all be taken care of as soon as possible.

*Reminder: you <u>must</u> give us permission to clean your family grave(s). We follow traditional rules and are uncomfortable doing any excessive cleaning on the grave, but we'll continuously clean around them.

Depending on what you need:

- To flatten or add more topsoil to a grave, have a tree removed, or any Q&A's about caskets or urns to contact our supervisor: Derwin Goddard, Asst: Jerome Sanchez
- For the bathrooms, or to borrow tools after hrs. (ie. Shovels, rakes, wheelbarrow) Please make contact with Caretaker Feather Villegas.
- For Headstone & Niche wall maintenance, please inform Cemetery staff of your request.
- Woodwork, you may request a temporary wooden cross or Placker for burial site, contact Gordon Hatch.

Emergency Food Voucher Program

This is a federally funded program and is available only to Nisqually Tribal Members. It provides assistance in purchasing healthy food(s). You must meet eligibility requirements to receive a food voucher. This program is income based, proof of income and residency must be provided when applying. One voucher provided per household address.

Daycare

Daycare provides childcare for qualifying applicants. Priority is given to low-income applicants who qualify for assistance through the Federal Block Grant. Daycare also accepts state and private payments for those individuals who do not meet low-income eligibility criteria through the Block Grant. Daycare compiles a wait list and eligibility for space is based on the above-mentioned criteria. Daycare can provide fees for service (state/private payments) as well as review applicant's eligibility for Block Grant funding.

Community Garden

Nisqually Community Garden works toward Tribal self-sufficiency and overall mental, physical, and spiritual health. We grow traditional plants, vegetables, berries, and fruit trees. All produce is distributed directly to Nisqually tribal members & community. We also host classes, provide job training services to tribal members through the Tribe and SPIPA, preserve food & medicines, put on annual events, and work closely with many tribal departments. General Assistance (GA):

The G.A. program is a monetary stipend to help clients become self-sufficient. Clients must be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe and residing in Thurston County. Clients that are eligible for the stipend must participate in monthly job searches to maintain eligibility. They have 12 job searches a month which they must show they did 3 searches per week. The General Assistance program also collaborates with other tribal program support.

Vocational Rehabilitation (VR)

The Nisqually Vocational Rehabilitation program assists Native Americans that are enrolled in a federally recognized tribe that have a disability that is a barrier to employment. The VR program provides culturally appropriate, community-based program of vocational rehabilitation services consistent with their individual strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, capabilities, interests, and informed choices so that they may prepare for and engage in gainful employment. Collaborates with tribal programs to encourage client self-sufficiency.

Workforce Development (WFD)

This program offers two types of services, TANF and workforce development.

<u>TANF</u>: provides a monthly cash grant to needy families with school-age children; must be enrolled in a federally recognized tribe; live in Thurston or Pierce County. Clients are required to search for a job or enroll in a full-time education program. Support services are offered in addition to a monthly grant.

<u>Workforce development:</u> provides support services only to individuals who are employed or in a full-time education program; enrolled in a federally recognized tribe; live in Thurston or Pierce County. The goal is to help individuals remain employed or successfully complete an education program.

The Tribal Court provides direct and non-direct judicial functions to ensure an autonomous court system that can enforce Tribal codes and other community regulations. This is done through the development and implementation of contemporary business and management practices provided by the court administration staff.

Probation & Truancy Services

Probation Services is an integral part of the court system and is dedicated to promoting public safety, by reducing criminal behavior and its impact on the community. Truancy Services is dedicated to eliminating barriers to regular school attendance by examining the root causes of non-attendance by providing comprehensive support to students and their families by removing social, economic, and cultural barriers.

Wellness Court

The Wellness Court creates a safe and healthy Tribal community by establishing a court-supervised therapeutic program designed to effectively address the health, culture, and spiritual needs of substance-abusing Tribal members involved in the criminal justice system.

Services Offered

Currently, we have six full-time staff members, with most of them holding different titles and positions related to culture. Additionally, we employ four part-time culture workers on contract.

We ensure that all necessary supplies, such as traditional food, preparing & gathering cedar bark and carving wood, beads, wool, weaving frames, sewing machines, and merchandise like t-shirts and bags, are provided for our culture nights, events, and practices, including canoe journey, song, and dance. Our overarching goals are to create a dedicated space for cultural supplies and artwork contributed by tribal and community members of all ages and to continue with cultural activities while collaborating with other programs to meet their cultural needs.

Teaching and practicing the Nisqually tribal traditions that have been passed down through generations is so important to the Leschi Heritage Culture Department. As we provide the culture supplies, we also tell the story, prayers, and protocols of why we practice these traditions (i.e. ceremony, canoe journey, Native events). We feel it is important to pass down teaching of our elders to our youth.

The Elders Program Supplemental Budget is to provide direct services to the Nisqually Tribal Members 55 years or older. The Elders Program works to assist Nisqually Tribal Member Elders in maintaining an independent lifestyle for as long as possible.

- Elders Assistance for Nisqually Tribal Members 55 Years or Older includes support for energy, water, and heating needs.
- Maintaining independence and wellness is prioritized, offering alternative care options and promoting health, prevention, and awareness.
- Weatherization and Home Repairs for Nisqually Tribal Members 55 Years or older.
- Operational costs cover fuel oil and postage.
- Elders can travel to recreational, social, and cultural events such as the Weavers Conference, Canoe Journey, and Intertribal Elders Luncheon.
- Events and activities are hosted at the Elders Center, planned annually, and coordinated with outside departments.

Emergency Management Services (EMS)

The Nisqually Emergency Management Department was established in 2010 with the purpose of aiding the Members and community of the Nisqually Tribe during declared natural or man-made disasters, both within the Nisqually Reservation and the surrounding service area.

We serve as the primary hub for FEMA within the Tribal Nation and support the Nisqually Tribe administration during inclement weather situations as needed.

Homeownership Services Provided

HAP (Housing Assistance Program)

Each adult Nisqually tribal member is eligible for \$30,000.00 towards down-payment assistance on a new home purchase. Applications are available at the Housing Office.

NEAP (Nisqually Emergency Assistance Program)

If you already own a home and have not utilized your Housing Assistance Program funds, Nisqually Emergency Assistance Program (NEAP) is designed to allow eligible adult Nisqually tribal members to access their \$30,000 and apply those funds towards home repairs and rehabilitation. Applications must be completed and approved prior to any work being done. Applications are available at the Housing Office.

Purchasing a home – Section 184 Home Loan

The Section 184 Indian Home Loan Guarantee Program is a home mortgage product specifically designed for American Indian families. Section 184 financing allows borrowers to get into a home with a low down payment and flexible underwriting terms – making homeownership more achievable. NITH partners with 1st Tribal Lending to help applicants secure Section 184 loans and take the first step to homeownership.

Rehabilitation and Modernization (HUD)

The Rehab and Modernization Program provides funding up to \$20,000 for eligible applicants for home repairs. Eligible applicants must own their homes and meet the income guidelines provided by HUD. Income levels will determine the amount of assistance NITH will provide to the household (\$10,000 will be awarded for applicants

between 80-100% of the Area Median Income (AMI) and \$20,000 will be awarded for applicants under 80% of AMI). Funding is limited and distributed on a first-come, first serve basis. Allowable activities under this program include: roofing, siding, insulation, sheet rock, flooring, cabinets, windows, doors, trim packages, HVAV units, wood/pellet stoves and limited appliances. Applications must be completed and approved prior to any work being done.

Rehabilitation and Modernization (Charitables)

The Rehab and Modernization Program (Charitables) provides funding up to \$10,000 for eligible applicants for home repairs. The Charitables funding allows Housing to provide this program to Nisqually Tribal Members of all income levels. Funding is limited and distributed on a first-come, first serve basis. Allowable activities under this program include: roofing, siding, insulation, sheet rock, flooring, cabinets, windows, doors, trim packages, HVAV units, wood/pellet stoves and limited appliances. Applications must be completed and approved prior to any work being done.

Rental Services Provided

Community Rental Assistance

The Community Homelessness Prevention and Rental Assistance Program provides Native American families living in eligible areas (Thurston County) up to \$5,000 towards payment of past due rent charges or move-in deposits and fees. The program is HUD-funded and applicant households must be under 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) to qualify.

Housing Services and Management

Housing oversees over 90 rental units throughout the reservation. Housing oversees every aspect of maintaining these homes, performing annual inspections, rehabilitation and maintenance of homes (both while occupied and during turnover), maintenance repairs, lease compliance, etc.

Housing also oversees the Housing Waitlist. The Waitlist is maintained and posted for public each month at the Housing Office and online. Waitlist members are listed by a 5-digit code (initials plus enrollment number) to maintain confidentiality. Housing ensures all Tribal Members on Waitlist are kept up to date. Housing ensures eligibility and fair tenant selection (based on date of application and meeting of criteria as found in EAO Policy). The Waitlist is always open and available for new applicants. Applications can be found in the Housing Office.

Gutter, Roof and Chimney Inspections

These systems are professionally inspected annually to ensure rental homes are kept in good condition for years to come.

Other Services Provided

Money 101 Classes

For 2025, Housing has partnered with Mason County Asset Building Coalition to bring a series of sixteen (16) classes designed to help Tribal Members manage, save and grow their money. Topics include banking, income and expenses, spending and saving, credit reports, borrowing, managing debt, credit cards, identity protection, homebuying, and taxes. Classes will be held weekly on Tuesday evenings from 530-630pm and can be attended in person at the Housing Conference Room or virtually on Zoom.

Community Clean-Up efforts

Housing provides the community with additional dumpster services quarterly to allow for large-scale cleanup efforts that cannot fit into typical weekly trash services. Housing also hosts a Community Clean-up Day shortly after the 4th of July holiday, bringing together volunteers from the reservation and providing them with materials and supplies to clear away debris and excess trash from fireworks.



Natural resources conservation - from the waters to fisheries, forests, and wildlife - is a priority. From waste reduction and water quality to a growing focus on sustainability, we are committed to providing a variety of services to meet our environmental vision.

- <u>Finfish Harvest Management</u> provides technical expertise and guidance on the management of all fin fish fisheries. Meets the requirements established in federal court orders.
- <u>Shellfish Harvest Management</u> provides technical expertise and guidance on the management of all shellfish fisheries. Meets the requirements established in federal court orders and agreed to management plans.
- <u>Salmon Recovery</u> Provides technical expertise and leadership on the implementation of our salmon recovery plans. Leads scientific research into salmon recovery actions supportive of adaptive management. The Program also contains TFW, Research and Monitoring, Restoration and Protection coordination and implementation, and public education and information sharing.
- <u>Salmon Enhancement Program</u> provides oversite of our salmon hatchery facilities at Kalama Creek and Clear Creek as well as taking on projects related to enhancement activities
- <u>Shellfish Farm</u> operates the Tribe's shellfish farm to provide shellfish in the diets of tribal members through harvest and distribution of shellfish to the community and by providing direct harvest opportunities to tribal members.
- <u>Environmental Program</u> This program provides expert analysis and comment on regulatory processes and the resulting permits for construction activity throughout our U&A with a focus on the Nisqually Watershed and surrounding marine waters.
- Wildlife Management Program The Wildlife Program works to promote, enhance and protect the access to treaty wildlife resources by the Nisqually Tribe, today, and for future generations. Activities include oversight of the hunting regulations, wildlife population surveys, wildlife management and research throughout the ceded territory of the Treaty of Medicine Creek. The program uses science and traditional knowledge to inform best practices in the restoration and protection of high-value wildlife resources and habitats whose future existence depends on adapting to a changing climate and environment.
- Geographical Information Services (GIS) This program provides GIS mapping services
 to all tribal programs, provides some data management services, and is developing a
 drone support system for field work.

Program Description

The Nisqually Police Department is comprised of a Chief of Police, Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants, 2 Corporals, and 20 officers including fish and wildlife. Our primary purpose is the preservation of life and property. We also enforce all criminal, and traffic laws within the interior and exterior boundaries of the Nisqually Indian Reservation. Our officers are certified through the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) and through Washington State Criminal Justice Training Center (WSCJTC). The fish and wildlife department patrols the rivers, and Puget sound protecting the natural resources.

Nisqually Police Department is a partially federally funded program that enforces all Criminal, and traffic laws within the interior and exterior boundaries of the Nisqually Indian Reservation. The police department is comprised of not only patrol officers, but fish and wildlife officers involved in the enforcement of natural resources. Our Officers interact within the community on a daily basis providing transparency and building rapport through Community Oriented Policing.

Fleet Service Program

Our Fleet Service Program, established in 2010, focuses on maintaining and repairing all Tribal vehicles, trailers, equipment, and vessels. With four shop mechanics and a mobile truck mechanic, we ensure the upkeep of 180 vehicles, 25 trailers, 16 boats, and 70 pieces of equipment. Our team consists of master mechanic who are ASE certified, and four of our five employees are enrolled Nisqually Tribal members. Our goal is to save Tribal funds by providing cost-effective maintenance and repairs for a wide range of vehicles and equipment.

Motor Pool

The Nisqually Motor Pool collaborates with department programs, committees, and employees to offer vehicles and equipment for daily use. We provide vehicles for instate travel, training, seminars, and other Tribal business needs. Our inventory includes 10 vehicles, with some available on a long-term loan basis, eliminating the need for additional vehicle purchases for new programs. Additionally, we have allocated five

vehicles to the Court program for Parole Officers, enabling them to begin their duties while awaiting the purchase of dedicated parole vehicles.

Transit

The Transit program ensures transportation for Tribal and community members, as well as employees, within our service area who lack temporary transportation options to reach work. Operating from Monday to Friday, 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., we employ six full-time staff members. Additionally, we offer the Nisqually Airport Shuttle service, providing transportation between Thurston County and SeaTac airport for Tribal members and employees. This shuttle operates seven days a week, from 6:00 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. for SeaTac arrivals. Our aim is to provide reliable transportation solutions to meet the needs of our community.

Youth Services

The Nisqually Youth Program provides comprehensive, educational, cultural, and health support services for tribal and community school-age youth K-12 and their families that result in increased student success and quality of life.

We are honored to support and preserve culture, lending praise and acknowledge our ancestors. We provide a friendly, healthy, and safe environment in our community. We are teaching confidence, teamwork, and leadership to future generations.

Tutoring is available face to face from 3pm to 6pm daily Monday through Friday. Online tutoring is available as well.

S.T.E.A.M. or (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics.), will be available Mondays 3pm-4:30 pm. Juan Carlos Chavez will be providing cultural-based STEAM modules throughout the year to youth of all ages.

Youth Culture Coordinator

Our Youth Culture Coordinator will be providing classes including weaving, carving, beading, and drumming making. He will be providing classes in school and after-school. Designated times will be determined for class times and room availability.

Health & Fitness

Health and fitness will be offered on a regular basis depending on (HAF) and Youth schedule. Workouts sessions will be offered to interested groups as well as individual plans. Nutritious meals and supplements will be available for pre and post workouts, also, meal preparation for weekly eating plans for youth.

Summer Youth Employment

Summer Youth Employment (Summer Youth 14-18 years of age) included Maintenance, Ranch, Natural Resources, IT, Youth Services, Camas Café, Garden, Culture, and youth camp. We are seeking additional placements for more employees next year. We serviced students in a fun and educational camp, that includes culture, recreation, and field trips. The program also signed up more than 100 students overall.



Nisqually people were first known as the Squally-absch, meaning "people of the grass country," referring to the many prairies that bloomed with blue camas blossoms east of Puget Sound.

Americans later changed the French word for us and the river, Nesquallies, to Nisqually. Our ancestors roamed 90 miles from the mouth of the Nisqually River in the summer where abundant salmon were caught and dried, to the upper watershed on Mount Rainier where hunting was excellent in the winter.

Nisqually Chief Leschi refused to sign the Treaty of Medicine Creek, which led to a better treaty for Nisqually later, though it still ceded thousands of acres of land to non-tribal settlers in return for maintaining our tribe's fishing, hunting and gathering as we always had. Federal and city governments later condemned hundreds of acres of Nisqually land for what became Ft. Lewis, now known as Joint Base Lewis-McChord.





Today, we have re-acquired some land for housing and a commercial presence that includes the Nisqually RedWind Casino, the Nisqually Markets and other enterprises employing 800 people in Thurston County, most of whom are non-tribal. Additionally, we employ an estimated 500 tribal and non-tribal people in government and service jobs. This puts Nisqually in the top 10 employers in Thurston County.

Yet we are still fishermen and people of the grass. As we have since time immemorial, we will be stewards of our land, our salmon, our heritage and our people.

We will always be here.
